

THE PRISONS (AMENDMENT) ORDINANCE, 1922.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to allow Asiatic and African subordinate officers, who enrol in the Prison Department of this Colony within six months of having received a certificate of discharge from the Prison Department of the Uganda Protectorate or Tanganyika Territory, to count such previous service as if it had been served in the Prison Department of this Colony.

This measure has had the approval of the Secretary of State in his despatch No. 1457 dated the 24th September, 1921.

Section	Remarks
1.	Short title.
2.	Amends Section 30 of the Principal Ordinance and authorises the previous service of Asiatic and African subordinate officers in the Prison Department of Uganda and Tanganyika to be counted towards service in the Prison Department of this Colony where the break in service has not been more than six months.
3.	Amends Section 38 of the Principal Ordinance for the purposes of counting such previous service towards gratuity.
