THE INDUSTRIAL ALCOHOL (AMENDMENT) ORDINANCE, 1922.STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This amending ordinance deletes the definition of "licensed premises", as being too wide, from the Principal Ordinance, Section 3 (2) of which is considered sufficiently clear for the purpose. Certain other small amendments are effected to the definitions, so that their meanings may be quite clear.

All these amendments are based on criticisms to the principal ordinance offered by the board of Imperial Customs and Excise, as intimated by the Secretary of State in his despatch no. ¹⁴⁶ 24791/1921 of the 2nd June, 1921.
