No explanation of the changes under the various items is given in the estimates, and it is desirable that more details should be furnished than is contained in the memorandum accompanying the despatch. The figures are based on the average imports for the last six months and may be regarded as a reasonable estimate. It is clear that the estimate is much in excess of the average for the last six months of 1923, and for 1924 must therefore be regarded with

Item VII: Administration. Under Item 2 provision

As this change was left to the Governor's decision, it is approved, but it seems probable that the change will necessitate some increase in acting allowances (Head IV). Information is desirable as to the action proposed in reference to the recommendations of the Select Committee in regard to possible reduction in the administrative staff.

old Items 41 (a) and 41 (c). Careful consideration has been given to these proposed appointments, which were explained in Sir C. Boring's despatch No. 1271 of the 13th of August but in present financial circumstances they cannot be approved, and they should be deleted. The estimated increase in Mombasa municipal revenue (Head IV Item 15) would be practically absorbed by the new appointments and in any case an explanation would be necessary as to why instead of the minimum of 2400 was inserted under item 4 (), and whether the abolition of the post of market master (item 42) was connected with the proposed new appointments.

old Items 58 and 66. There is no increase under these items for conservancy at Eldon - 2399. The increases were recommended by the Select Committee but

such substantial increases can hardly be undertaken by Government in present circumstances; the total increase on these items should not exceed £200.

Item 91. In view of the financial position it seems impossible to approve the change from a European Clerk on £250 - £400 to a Revenue and Statistical Officer on £400 - £500. The Estimates should be amended by deleting item 91 and re-inserting a European Clerk.

Item 92. The change in title of this post can be accepted if it is considered desirable, but the salary must remain on the approved scale £400 - 20 - £500; compare item 68. In this connection it may be pointed out that a salary scale of £400 - £600 is shown for these posts in the printed staff lists, on what authority is not known.

Items 197 - 202. There are considerable increases under these heads to permit of increased native registration. During 1924 it would be well to curtail any expansion of registration in order that necessary economies may be effected.

Items 293 - 301. The subsidies to chiefs in Jubaland amount to more than the total hut and poll tax for that province (item 14 h of Head III). There are other provinces where the subsidies appear to bear rather high a proportion to the amount of hut and poll tax raised. It is desirable that the presents and subsidies to chiefs should where possible be a small percentage of the amount of hut and poll tax raised in their districts.
