My Lord,

I have the honour to refer to a petition addressed to Your Lordship by the African Civil Service Association of the British East Africa Protectorate, copies of which have been sent to both Sir E. Northey and myself.

2. This petition is laid before Your Lordship in accordance with Section 8 of Sir Alfred Lascelles's Report of 2nd April 1919 on the grounds that certain of the African Clerical Staff of this Government is undergoing hardships which warrant this procedure.

3. The main complaints advanced are:

- (a) Reduction of War Bonus
- (b) Abolition of House Allowance and
- (c) Non-pensionable status.

For Your Lordship's information I will deal with each point raised in turn:

(a)

(c) Non-Pensionable Status:

That the African should be enabled after a long term of service to enjoy a pension is a principle deserving every support, the more as thrift is seldom among his virtues. The question therefore again arises, is the African to come on to the basis of the Asiatic or is he to form a class of his own. As I have stated above the Chief Native Commissioner inclines to the former view, the Treasurer strongly holds the latter, which I share. This is, that the lower grades of Civil Service should and will be staffed steadily more and more by Africans and that as soon as possible an African Civil Service should be evolved on lines of its own, Rules and Regulations evolving to meet the problems which will arise. This African Staff, living in their own country should require a much smaller salary than the Asiatic: it would therefore be inadvisable to admit the African today to footing of emoluments equal to those of the Asiatic in view of the difficulty of a reduction later to a scale suited to Africans.

Again, I think, a point of some importance that this class should not be exalted above the native, otherwise we may one day find ourselfes suffering from an excess of partially educated Indians with a corresponding lack of craftsmen.

5. I have the honour, therefore, to  
submit to your Lordship's favourable consider-  
ation that:

(1) African drawing Rs:30/- or over shall  
draw War Bonus on the scale proposed in my para-  
graph 3 (a).

(2) That this grade of African Civil Servant  
shall receive Rs:5/- per month House Allowance.

(3) That steps be taken to form an African  
branch of the Civil Service on a pensionable  
basis.

6. I trust Your Lordship will take an  
opportunity of discussing this petition and the  
questions raised therein, with Sir Edward Northey  
before his return to East Africa.

## WAR BONUS.

The award of a war bonus to members of the East African Protectorate Civil Service has now received the sanction of the Secretary of State for the Colonies and will be paid to the amount and subject to the conditions hereinunder.

The bonus will be payable in respect of periods spent in the East African Protectorate, with retrospective effect from the 1st of January, 1917, and with further notice. The bonus will also be payable in respect of periods of leave or service outside the Protectorate.

Bonus will however be payable in the case of members of the Railways, Customs and Forest staff who have been stationed in Uganda in respect of periods spent in Uganda.

3. The eligibility for war bonus of periods during which Military pay, or salary who has received military rank or pay, or has drawn any military pay, rations, or allowances under consideration, but claims should not be present before the period thereof.

4. Subject to the fulfilment of other conditions laid down in this circular bonus will be payable to all civil servants who have been continuously in the Government service from the 1st of January, 1916. Those who have joined the Government service since that date will also be eligible provided that they have been appointed to posts on rates of salary which are laid down in the Estimates or are in accordance with scales approved prior to the 1st of January, 1916, and which have not been increased as a result of war conditions.

No person whose emoluments, as defined in para 10, exceed the following scale is eligible for war bonus.—Maximum emoluments of persons eligible

Married Europeans	£600 p.a.
Unmarried	£440 p.a.
Married Non-Europeans	Rs. 270 p.m.
Unmarried	Rs. 180 p.m.

5. Africans whose pay is less than Rs. 30 p.m. are not Africans on staff entitled to the bonus, except the rank and file of the Native Police, Prison Warders, Customs Watchmen, and Postmen.

6. The amounts of bonus payable will be in accordance with the schedules for

Where house allowance is not drawn and Government quarters are not occupied, an additional Rs. 20 will be payable monthly, provided that the monthly enrolments added to the monthly amount of bonus do not thereby exceed Rs. 270; in which case the difference between the monthly enrolments and Rs. 270 will be payable.

N.B.—The total Enrolments should include subsistence, house or house allowance, personal allowance, and acting allowances, etc., plus Rs. 20 taken to represent the value of house or house allowance whatever it may be, but not exceeding Rs. 400.

Marry'd Non-Europeans, other than Africans, whose substantive salary is less than Rs. 20 per month, come under Schedule V or VI.

Bonus will be paid to those of the rank and file of the Police, Prison Warders and Customs Watchmen who draw less than Rs. 30 per mensem, and to Forest Guards at the following rates:

Bonus in respect of the period from the 1st of January, 1917, to the 31st of March, 1918, a sum of Rs. 30 in a lump sum, which will be reduced proportionately if bonus is not payable in respect of the whole period; and

In respect of the period subsequent to the 31st of March, 1918, Rs. 5 p.m. will be paid.

AFRICANS. In respect of the period from the 1st of January, 1917, to the 31st of March, 1918, no bonus will be paid.

Implementation of the bonus rates quoted to the 31st of December, 1918, will be paid.



Reference your A.O. Discharge/164/700, I have the following remarks to make on Lieutenant J. W. Jackson's claim for further remuneration:

Lieutenant Jackson was seconded from the E.S.A. Police to the Military Labour Corps and received his commission as second Lieutenant on the 5/1/18 G.R.O. 169; he was released from service on the 14/7/19.

He was asked to reenage for one year as from 1/4/19 under Force Order 23 but refused to do so, in the end, although he verbally promised to do so.

He remained in the M.L.C. to suit his own convenience nor did he ever ask for his release until the 7th of June when he without giving any reason suddenly demanded his release. This was granted to him at once, although it meant considerable inconvenience in replacing him.

As he did not reenage he was not entitled to the 5 day's leave granted under Force Order 23 nor to Army of Occupation pay which was only applied to East African Protectorate troops serving under that order.

He was not entitled to a passage to England as he was not locally enlisted or commissioned here, but in Rhodesia.

Far from Lieutenant Jackson demanding his release in January or February he had then applied on the 3rd of January for a position as Assistant District Commissioner in the East Africa Protectorate through the Director of Military Labour and on the 25th March he had an interview with the D.M.L. concerning this appointment in which he asked the D.M.L. to recommend him for the post. This the D.M.L. did on the 3/4/19. It was only when Lieut. Jackson was informed that there was no vacancy that he applied for his release.

From what I know of Lieut. Jackson which is borne out by his personal file I am quite certain he only remained with the M.L.C. to suit his own ends and if he had wished to do so before he did, no consideration for the Corps or his brother Officers would have weighed against his personal conveniences.

I would strongly deprecate Lieut. Jackson obtaining any benefits which other Officers who worked harder and with more personal sacrifice, do not get.
