Re Passages to East Africa.

I have the honour to recall to your notice my visit  
of 25th Inst., re above matter.

As instructed by you, I attach hereto copy of  
letter from the Crown Agents for the Colonies.

This matter arose out of a request asking the  
Crown Agents to advise as the manner of arranging that my  
wife and child should travel by the steamer I was allotted  
to.

The present difficulty of arranging such matters is  
fully appreciated, but in this case it is so necessary for  
me to accompany my wife and young daughter (age 4 1/2), that if  
it is impossible to accommodate us on the September boat, our  
departure will require to be postponed till the following  
sailing.

The reason why it is necessary for me to accompany  
my family is because of my wife's present health, and the  
danger of the harm which she may suffer travelling un-  
assisted.
