

As directed by the Hon'ble Chief Secretary these papers have been carefully considered together with the Trade Commissioner in the light of the prevailing conditions of the Protectorate and it is believed that the following recommendations and comments while being in accordance with the wishes of the Secretary of State as expressed in the Circular Despatch under reference, make locally feasible the conclusions at which the Committee arrived.

2. Particular attention has been paid to the prevention of overlapping between the Annual General Report, the Trade Commissioner's Report, the Blue Books and the projected Handbook. Such overlapping must occur if these returns are prepared independently and it would appear best that the Trade Commissioner should be furnished as early as possible with draft copies of the Blue Book and other Returns and also the Annual Reports of the following Departments:-

Customs

Port

Railway

Agricultural and Veterinary

Forests

Native Affairs (or such parts as relate to labour).

TREASURY.

It is recognized that the Treasurer's Report being based on the financial year must until that year coincide with the calendar year, only reach the Trade Commissioner's hands after he has completed his main Annual Report which is furnished by the calendar year.

year. The Trade Commissioner could however deal with the last extant Treasurer's report vis that nine months old.

The Commissioner having drawn up his Report detailed above and derived from the original, it is command should furnish a copy to the Chief Secretary whose comments thereon would form that part of the annual general Report. This indeed is indicated in paragraphs 17 - 20 of Appendix I to the Report under comment; the only new suggestion here is the order and manner in which these Returns should be delivered so as to avoid confusion.

2. Quarterly Returns. Under the form of the Returns at present, the delivery of the quarterly Returns is necessarily delayed and the public are compelled to wait for the publication of the

Report. It is suggested that the delivery of the quarterly Returns be speeded up by the publication of the Report and Return earlier than at present. A more prompt delivery of the Customs Quarterly Returns will also be of great assistance to the public, the Trade Commissioner, and Government. It would assist the Trade Commissioner if copies of these quarterly Returns were sent to him simultaneously as to the Chief Secretary.

3. Blue Books. The new form suggested in Appendix I to the Report could be followed with advantage, though as the new model forms have got to be prepared

the next Blue Book must be in the older mould. There appears however to be a great quantity of unnecessary matter in the present Blue Book, as indeed is noted in the Secretary of State's despatch No. 876 of November 29th 1914.

(Note: The Trade Commission have been through the attached copy of the 1915-16 Blue Book and have marginally suggested retentions (R) and omissions (O).)

6. For the immediate future it is recommended that a Blue Book be brought out, in the suggested shorter form, with full details for the financial year ending March 31st 1920 - but shown in statistical portion. The totals for the financial years ending 31st March 1917, 1918 and 1919, and the Blue Book for those three years, will be given at the end of this paper.

It is suggested that the three financial years should be used for purposes of comparison.

In preparing the Blue Book for the financial years 1917, 1918 and 1919 it is deprecated on the grounds of cost and labour. Figures of value must be modern.

7. It must however be recognised that with the utmost expedition it will be impossible to produce the sections of the Blue Books, mentioned under A General (1) of Appendix I to the Report, by the second week in February; the Quarterly Customs Returns take at present 5 months to appear in the Gazette and though their delivery may be accelerated the period laid down by the Sub-Committee is undoubtedly too short.

8. The Financial Sections of the Blue Book cannot be produced before the end of the financial year. The emphasis laid upon early renditions of Blue Book Returns leads to the recommendation that the Blue Book Returns should be furnished in two or more parts annually.

Annual Reports.

The necessity for the Annual General Report to follow the calendar year (save for its financial portion) arises from its foundation upon Blue Book returns to some extent vide paragraph 6 of Appendix II to the Report. The Blue Book returns to be of greatest and most convenient use to the manufacturing trades etc. The Trade Commissioner's report (?) must be by the calendar year and the Annual General Report must cover the same period. If therefore the recommendations with reference to Blue Book herein contained are followed an Annual General Report for the period April 1st to December 31st 1920 will be necessary.

10. The method of arriving at the Governor's Report on the subjects mentioned in paragraphs 17-20 of Appendix II has been dealt with above in paragraphs 2 to 4.

11. Hand Books. The desirability of such a production is undeniable and the Trade Commissioner Colonial Franklin strongly favours the inclusion of the Handbooks on the East Africa Protectorate, Uganda and Zanzibar, possibly also the Tanganika Territory in one volume on the ground that their communications, Postal Service, and Customs are practically identical.

In any case it would be advantageous if the handbooks on the first three countries named were bound in one volume.

12. It is not considered feasible to produce such a Handbook before 1922 partly because much material has to be collected and revised partly owing to the present unsettled state of Trade and Commerce.

Copies of existant and the next Handbooks produced by other colonies might reasonably be sent here

13. Summary.

A. Blue Books.

- (a) The next to be prepared that for the year ending March 31st 1920.
- (b) Thereafter a 9 months Blue Book on the old model.
- (c) Thereafter a Blue Book by the Calender year and on the new model.
- (d) Copies of all Blue Book returns required by him to be furnished to the Trade Commissioner.

B. Annual General Reports.

- (a) Following on the Report for 1919-20 now in preparation a nine months Report for the period April 1st to December 31st 1920.
- (b) Reports ~~to be submitted~~ by the Calender year.
- (c) Financial Report to be an appendix.
- (d) To be considered partly as supplementary to the Main Report.

Paragraph 9. At the point of a "quid pro quo" in return for the Blue Books the recommendations in paragraph 13 of the Main Report are strongly endorsed.

Paragraph 11. The present file size is recommended for retention.

Paragraph 12. Meteorology. It is suggested that the Director of Agriculture suggest a better organization for the whole Protectorate than at present exists based upon the remarks of the Sub-Committee pages 14 and 15 of Appendix I to the Report.

Memoranda. A proposal might usefully be made of
copies of the Memoranda sent to the Secretary of
State in response to his Circular A of June 11th
1919. The publication of such a précis antecedent
to the first Handbook would supply information
presently required and the précis could later be
used as a basis for portions of the Handbook.
