E. African Dept:

I have now received the further information called for and after full consideration of the details which have been furnished to me, I am of opinion that the full amount of £250, as provided for in the East Africa Protectorate Estimates for the current year, without any deduction whatsoever, should be paid by Zanzibar as a reimbursement to the East Africa Protectorate towards the cost of maintaining the necessary staff in the Protectorate in order to make it possible for the Auditor to undertake a satisfactory examination of the accounts of the Government of Zanzibar, any local expenses such as cost of passages to and from the Protectorate, local travelling, subsistence, gharry and office boys etc. being met direct from Zanzibar funds.

It is stated that the amount of £250 is to be considered as a reimbursement to the E.A. Protectorate of the sum of £250 which has been supplied to the audit of the accounts of the Government of Zanzibar.

I have the honour to inform you that when I was in Zanzibar in Nov last, the Financial Member of Council sent me an extract from a despatch recently received from the Secretary of State, to the effect that the sum of £450 provided in the 1912 estimate, as a reimbursement to the East African Government for the expenses of Audit in Zanzibar, was to cover all charges with the exception of house rent. Last year a sum of £700 was allowed for, viz. £450 as a loan sum to be paid to the East Africa Protectorate, and £250 for local expenses, such as cost of passages to and from the East Africa Protectorate, Office and Rickshaw boys local travelling on the Zanzibar and Pemba Islands, and travelling allowances. The Financial Member of Council informs me that he will treat all such charges now as an advance to the East Africa Protectorate, which will mean that my audit will have to bear the cost.
