Letters and documents are usually required to be submitted before proceeding to East Africa, and you will be requested, before proceeding to East Africa, to undergo a course of instruction, lasting about two months, on various subjects before leaving England, in the following subjects:- General History, Administration, Colonial Law, take up their appointment. Circumstances being Evidence and Procedure, Tropical Economic Products, Elementary Statistics, personnel of your Department being prepared for the Colonial System of Accounts. Particulars of the same are given in the memorandum, and it is therefore to be understood that you will be required to take the course during your leave of absence.

5. If you are prepared to accept the appointment on these conditions, you should present yourself to one of the medical advisers of this Department, whose names are given on the enclosed letter, for the purpose of being medically examined. The letter is to be left with him; and you will be required to pay him a fee of one guinea. He will send his report direct to this Department.

6. I am to request that you will state whether you accept this offer. If you are passed as physically fit for service, you will be required to furnish me with the name and permanent address of a relative (stating his or her relationship to you) for reference in case of emergency.
