Sir,

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Read's letter of the 28th instant (37116/1912) and its accompanying copy of a telegram from the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate stating that the amount authorised in the Protectorate's Estimates for 1912/13 under Public Works Extraordinary, New Roads and Bridges, has been already exhausted, and requesting authority to expend an additional sum of £2,000 on that vote.

In reply I am to request you to inform Mr. Secretary Harcourt that, in the circumstances represented, My Lords sanction the proposed expenditure on the understanding that it will be met from general savings of which account has not been taken in framing the Estimates for 1913-14 and that no excess will be caused on the total expenditure authorised for the Protectorate for the current financial year.

They will be glad to be informed in due course how the amount has actually been spent.
