Can you say exactly how E.A.P. salaries in Forestry Department compare with those in India? A.C.C.P. 4/9.

As far as I can make out from India Office List 1909 the scale is roughly:-

- 1. Inspector General £2100 per annum
- 2. Chief Conservators £1700 " "
- 19 Conservators
  - Grade 1 £1600 per annum
  - " 2 £1400 " "
  - " 3 £1275 " "

72 Asst. " " } rising by annual

increments of 40 R. per month to £560 thereafter by rises of 50 Rs. per month annually to £1000 (abt.) in 20th year of service.

The service is pensionable after 20 years service or at 55 at rate of 30/60 of average emoluments, the limit being about £520 a year for 25 years service

and upwards, and £270 for 20-24 years service.

These figures are round numbers generally rather less than the actual figures. If you like I will get this checked later when Mr Clay comes back from leave.

You may like to see this interesting comparison between the Indian and East Africa Protectorate Forestry services. Of course, the East Africa Protectorate service is extremely limited. A conservator at £500 .25.700 (pensionable) and £50 duty pay; 4 Assistant Conservators @ £300 or £250 (non-pensionable) and a dozen Foresters @ <sup>120</sup>£100.10.200.

Personally I do not see why we cannot make all the Assistant Conservators pensionable, and it is not unlikely that we may have to raise their salaries if we are to get decent men. But we do not pretend to have a big Forestry Department in East Africa Protectorate as in India, and one cannot really compare the two. Time - perhaps a short time - will show whether or not we can get and keep good candidates, but I think there would be no objection to asking the Officer Administering the Government East Africa Protectorate in a confidential despatch whether or not he considers the Assistant Conservators should be given pension rights - pointing out that the Indian Forestry Service carries pension rights - and that it is understood that the absence of pension rights has been responsible in some measure for limiting the supply of candidates.
