With reference to the recent discussion  
between representatives of the Colonial Office and  
of the Post Office concerning engineering appointments  
in the Colonies, in which the Colonial Office  
letter No. 30629/12, of the 5th of last month  
relates, I am directed by the Postmaster-General  
to acquaint you for Secretary Barron,<sup>1912</sup>  
information that, amongst others, the vacancy for an  
Assistant Telegraph Engineer in British East  
Africa and Uganda (Colonial Office letter No. 50/5/1912  
of the 10th February last) ~~is~~ has been temporary  
Telegraph Engineer in the Coast Colony (Colonial  
Office letter No. 74/5/1912 of the 1st of March 1912)  
were with other vacancies advertised in the  
Official Circular.

The best candidate for this post in the Post  
Office service, who happened to be a former  
appointment appears to be Mr T. Baile, promoted  
Lineman, now an Inspector in the Provincial Railways.  
An excellent officer of his class, and is reported to  
have a good practical knowledge of the routine work  
of telegraph engineering, but he does not appear  
to be the type of candidate required. He applied  
on the occasion of the previous notification of the  
vacancy; but Mr Gosling, the Postmaster-General of  
East Africa's & Uganda, said expressly that he  
did not desire that Mr Baile should be appointed.

The objection raised to Mr Baile would probably

also apply, although in a less degree, to another candidate for the post, Mr G.H. Ellis, formerly in the employ of the National Telephone Company. He is moreover 40 years of age and a married man with one child.

Mr H.S. Chittick, who was formerly in the service of the Post Office as an Assistant Engineer, is also a candidate for the post. His application for the appointment, made directly to the Colonial Office, was sent to the Office for consideration in the Colonial Office letter No. 7116/10 dated 13th of this month. The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Mr Chittick's service with the Post Office is as follows:-

Mr Chittick was employed in the Electrical Department from 1st December 1910 to 31st October 1912. He first underwent a course of training at headquarters for six months, and was then employed for 21 months in Provincial Engineering Section where he obtained some experience of the duties of a Sectional Engineer. He was subsequently engaged at headquarters for 13 months in connection with Wireless Telegraph, followed by 6 months' work on Electric Light and Power duties mainly in connection with Pneumatic Plant and Telephone Exchange power plant.

Mr Chittick is a man of ability, but the Engineer-in-Chief is unable to say that he has had the experience which is no doubt required for the vacant position.



Sir, I will inform you that you have been appointed by the Secretary of State to serve in the East African Protectorate, and he has directed me to

inform you that, subject to your being passed as physically fit for

service, he proposes to select you for probationary appointment as Assistant Telegraph Engineer in East Africa.

Your salary at the rate of £350 p.a.

You will be liable to serve both in the East Africa Protectorate and in Uganda.

2. A memorandum showing the general conditions attached to appointment in the Protectorate and a copy of the leave and passing regulations for civil officers are enclosed herewith, but you are to understand that you will be subject to any regulations which may hereafter be introduced by or with the sanction of the Secretary of State. A copy of the regulations as to pensions and a copy of the Colonial Regulations are also enclosed.

Your attention is specially directed to para 15 of the first of these memoranda dealing with the provision of first quarters.

3. If you are prepared to accept the appointment on these conditions, you should present yourself to one of the medical advisers of this Department, whose names are given on the enclosed letter, for the purpose of being medically examined. The letter is to be left with him, and you will be required to pay him a fee of one guinea. He will send his report direct to this Department.
