 we want to go in a body. My two Sons
 who are there would inspect & decide
 which district would be most suitable
 for our requirements & would act for
 the present on our behalf. I think per-
 sonally that we should prefer the City
 district or the Northern Basar reserve.

Sir,

I understand that Mr. William Evans, Woodhouse Fields Burton upon Wenlock, Shropshire, is applying for a grant of land on the "Highlands" of British East Africa and he has asked me to say what I know of him and his family. He is a well-known tenant farmer in South Shropshire, and I know him to be a thoroughly practical agriculturist in every branch of the business. He has brought up his family on his farms and I never came across such a united family; they all pull together, and to this, they owe their success in life. I feel sure that if they are able to start farming in British East Africa, that they will be found just the class of practical hard working men, who are so much needed in that grand agricultural and stock-raising country. Mr. Evans' eldest son was engaged by me some years ago to take charge of stock which I had purchased on behalf of the Government, for the farm at Naivasha. He obtained employment out there, and is since married and intends to stay there. Two other of Evans' sons have been engaged by me to take out stock - one of them on two occasions - and was thanked by the Director of Agriculture for the good condition the stock was landed in, after a very rough passage. Last year, Mr. Evans himself, wishing to see his sons, went in charge of prize animals which I had purchased for the East Africa Syndicate, among which was a Hereford bull that won the Championship at

Nakuru show over all breeds.

I mention these facts to show that Mr. Evans and his family are thoroughly conversant with live stock. Perhaps I may mention that my brother Sir Clement Hill, K.C.M.G., M.P., has met Mr. Evans and I believe would be willing to explain the position of the land which I understand Mr. Evans would prefer to settle upon. Sir Clement of course with his long African experience would know the position of the land better than I can explain.
