Sir,

I have the honour to refer to paragraph 4(b) of my despatch No. 700 of the 5th of October 1912 respecting the appointment of an Agricultural Instructor in the Kisii country.

2. As I have already reported, the Instructor is now engaged in carrying out the scheme, but it has been pointed out that for the more efficient performance of his duties it will be necessary to employ permanently one reliable headman and at least six men as general assistants. The estimated expenditure thereby incurred is Rs. 1,080 or £72 per annum and can be met from surplus funds. I have no doubt that the benefits which will be gained by a more thorough supervision and more complete continuity of the work will more than repay the outlay and I trust that you will accord your sanction to this proposal,

proposal, in the first instance for one year.

3. In this connection I desire to bring to your notice the fact that Mr. Ainsworth anticipates that within the first twelve months the crops obtained from the farm will produce no inconsiderable amount of revenue. Part of the seed will be set aside for distribution amongst the natives and the remainder it is proposed to sell. It is hoped that the proceeds accruing from the sale of this surplus in the first year may be sufficient to meet the additional expenditure now asked for, and it may well happen that the farm will eventually be able to pay its way under every head, besides having been instrumental in instructing natives in the more civilized methods of agriculture. If these expectations are realized, I have the honour to ask that any surplus revenue may be placed to the credit of the farm to be expended in an extension of operations.
