Your letter to Read (who is now away) of the 25th - purchase of land on the northern island.

The balance at 31 March 1913 was, according to the completed figures, £226,363, after deducting the amount of the services which the Gov. is going to ask for permission to carry forward into 1914.

We cannot say definitely how far the additional expenditure contemplated is for the year involving spending money from the balance, or so far as possible the expenditure is necessary to be met from

balance, but you will understand

that the necessary legal sanction is required for the balance, if necessary for

(1) the purchase of the land (you letter of 19 July 1913) amount £7,000

(2) half cost of Amberwater land (you letter of 19 June) probably amount £12,000. However £20,000
