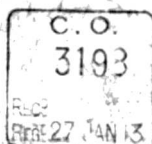

DAR-ES-SALAAM.

December 5th, 1912.

Sir:-

With reference to my letter of the 25th November respecting a rumour that gold had been discovered in the neighbourhood of Tanga, I have the honour to report that according to an article in the D.O.A. Zeitung of the 4th instant alluvial gold was found recently in a plantation on the river Sigi. The samples sent by the plantation owner to Germany were reported on so favourably that a gold fever set in in the district of Tanga and almost every inch of land between the mouth of the river Sigi and its confluence with the Mkuluzi has been taken up. In all there are probably over a hundred claims, but it is not likely that very many of them will prove remunerative.

There is a considerable amount of prospecting for quartz gold in the neighbouring mountains and there is a rumour, hitherto unconfirmed, of the discovery of a vein of gold by Roumanian engineer.
