? Officers are strongly advised to have themselves inoculated against enteric fever before proceeding to East Africa. By arrangement with the inoculation of S.C. Officers is performed at the Royal Army Medical College, London S.W.

In order to obtain the maximum efficacy of protection these inoculations are necessary - the second taking place four to six weeks after the first. The officials concerned should be in communication with the Commandant of the College as soon after the selection as possible. Some further arrangements may be made.

 in order to obtain the maximum
 degree of protection.
 Two inoculations are necessary
 in order that the most effective
 immunity may be secured.

Second inoculation taking
place from ten to fourteen
days after the first. Officers
should therefore communicate
with the Commandant of the
College, as soon after their
selection as possible, in
order to allow sufficient
time for the necessary
arrangements to be made.
