I've asked the Gov for this information on M/29708/13
as the case of ... gave us a good deal
of trouble.

There are at present two other Europeans
serving under non-European conditions (apart
from certain railway employees, who are
appointed under special terms.)

I think we should tell the Gov that
the two officers referred to in his despatch
should be granted the same privileges
with regard to leave transport etc as
other European Officers, and that care
should be taken in future that no Europeans
be engaged in Depts other than the Railway,
except under the conditions of service
of the European staff

I kept this in connection with the question

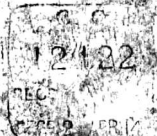

With reference to the concluding paragraph of your Confidential despatch of September 5th 1913, I have the honour to inform you that the number of Europeans serving under the conditions of the Non-European Staff amounts at present to two only, viz: Mr. T. Davidson, Boy Tracer, Survey Department, and Mr. N. R. Jolley, Telegraph Department.

2. There are a number of Europeans in the Railway Department serving under Non-European conditions but they are appointed under special terms of service and their case need not therefore be considered.

3. If it is your intention to make any alteration in the existing regulations I am strongly of the opinion that it is desirable that officers of accepted European parentage whether engaged locally or otherwise should receive the same leave privileges as those engaged from home.
