Sir

I am directed by the Marquess of Crewe to acknowledge the receipt of Mr. Redd's letter of Mr. 15th June, No. 19710, on the position of British Indian subjects in the East Africa Protectorate.

In the Protectorate the position of British Indians is not complicated by the existence of indentured labour or of the self-yoverning powers possessed by a Dominian, and His Lordship is not aware of any justification for assigning in the Crown Colonies or Protectorates to British Indians who are not indentured labourers a status in any way inferior to that of any other class of His Majesty's subjects resident in the Colony. It is hoped that this principle will be borne in mind by the Governor in examining any grievances that may be laid before him.
