SIR,

I have the honour to refer to my despatch No. 202 of the 12th of April 1910 on the subject of the Education Estimates, and particularly to the scale of fees which it was proposed to levy on the pupils attending the Indian School, Nairobi.

2. I am glad to be able to report that as the result of a concession granted to the Indian residents that the education of their children at the first two standards should be carried on in the vernacular, the number of pupils in the Indian School has risen from five in May last to over one hundred. As however nearly the half of these children are of very tender age, the Director of Education has deemed it more satisfactory to institute a ~~unorganized~~ class, and he recommends that the fees payable by parents attending this class should be at the rate of £1/- per month instead of the normal rate of £4-2/-.


