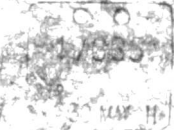

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 26th inst., and respectfully ask that my colonial service, since October of 1904, which during the first three years must have been reported - how very favorably since I was promoted three times, also in 1908, when my salary was again increased, should be given weight with a view to an opportunity of getting further service.

I would also point out the good health I have (with exception of part of one year 1908) always enjoyed, and to the utmost, in his service, no real leave having been taken during, shall I say, I have given.

In 1908, when I returned, to last before your leave, I had chosen of going on first instance to the highlands of the coast; I went to the coast and was employed, continually, in the field as one of the most unhealthy parts, the (Colum District) &c. I then had some general duties, but was frequently severely ill. I did not altogether get rid of the fever until about 1909 after I was again in country, I may say that I have since the first letter the only other member of the Army Department, the names of which are not given, who I returned to last before in 1908, was I think away to the very same service (1907-8) at home.

The great efforts have, throughout my
 journey, the length of which I should have
 mentioned from my long hours, and also
 the very full services (including) in return to
 your office during the whole period of the
 long voyage, in a respectful and highly
 done, which 1859 I have enjoyed
 without doubt and had no further
 of my kind and as I stated in my letter
 to the Crown Agents, I am not quite
 fit for immediate service.

I enclose a copy of a report made
 out on my services in last year, from
 which it can be seen that I had completed
 about 2 1/2 years of the present agreement, and
 although I am not gratified very much, not
 being allowed a single hour.

As to professional qualifications, I am
 willing if necessary to attend at whatever
 practical examination as to my abilities, and
 I can submit my full notes & calculations
 including the triangulation work, which notes
 is one of the drawings (see the 1858 plan) - I
 would also, whenever during the five months
 previous to returning to this country, I have
 also long experience of actual life & surveys
 & the nature of the work, which should naturally get
 me a most satisfactory result.

I have always been anxious to see more
 of other employment in public work and would
 not if it was respect the orders I got in last year.

If by some momentary opportunity you should
 be able to send me the survey of the last
 year, I should be very glad to see it, and I should
