The me opinion on the matter as
pressed to has been rather lengthy and
prolonged. I feel nevertheless that I must most
respectfully continue to press my legitimate
claims, and bring the whole matter to your
personal notice for consideration of and
equitable adjustment

might I suggest to you Honor that
if a personal interview were in any way convenient
or desirable I shall be glad to put my time
at your disposal by often matters which took
an inordinate amount of time to settle by
correspondence was easily and satisfactorily
settled by a short personal interview
