ROBERTS E. Age 26; single, educated at London Board Schools and Grocers' Company's School; enlisted into Army Service Corps as a clerk 1902; 2nd Corporal 1908; detached for service in Somaliland 1909 and latterly was in charge of the Civil Ordnance Store.

Reports Commissioner Manning:- "Has shown great ability in the performance of his duties, and has earned the good opinion of all officers under whom he has served".

Staff Officer V.A.R.:- "Did very good work in Somaliland".

Acting Commissioner Wyatt:- "I have found him willing, hardworking and in every way efficient, and have formed a high opinion of his abilities. His appearance and manner are in his favour, and his steady habits fit him for service in a tropical climate".

Colonel Graham spoke highly of him to Mr. Leach:- "A top-hole man".

Freeman E.A.
