I have the honor to address you on the following subjects which will be mainly based on the suggestion of Mr. Meriton, Stonefield on 21st January, 1912, in the Telegraph Department, Telegraphic Report No. 100, which No. 68 of 1911 date.

1. As the result of the amalgamation of the Postal and Telegraph Departments, the Postmaster General is of opinion that the post office held by Mr. Meriton inconveniently located, since in future it will be under the Superintendence of the Post Office will be retained at the existing Correspondence Section of the Post Office, and the telegraph will be combined with the Post Office.

2. As however, the number of official functions, Mr. Meriton's office is now untenable owing to increased traffic, and therefore is rapidly increasing in importance and quantity. I consider that the post should not be made a public establishment of great importance have the honor to ask that an additional office be erected.
