

(1) Clause 3(b) of the Schedule

should read:-

"Half salary will be paid from the date of embarkation on first engagement."

"Full salary will begin from the date of disembarkation in the African Coast."

(1) Clause 6(2) of the Schedule should read:-

"The Govt shall provide the person engaged with a free passage

"to the P.R. but shall provide him with a passage back to England only as hereinbefore provided."

As a new subsection should be added:-

"(3) The Govt shall provide full passages to the P.R. his wife & children of the firm engaged, if after one year's employment in the P.R. as from the date of his arrival at Mombasa his services as a Forester are retained, but the Govt shall provide him with the passages back to England for his wife & children as hereinbefore provided."

I have this opportunity of transmitting to you a copy of a draft from the Govt General detailing the arrangements to be made for various Foresters now in the service of the Govt. The last document was inf'd. by Govt that recommendation was approved.
