In reply to your despatch No. 745 of the 27th instant, I have the honour to report that the question of native rights existing in an area of 10,000 acres on the Tana, also in respect of which the British East Africa Corporation desires to transfer to the Felt African Cotton Company Limited, has not been the subject of any recent communication to me by native representatives.

2. It was my desire to await the return of Major Lennox, who has the previous negotiations to complete.

3. The Corporation is at present aware that there are difficulties in connection with native occupation.
