Sir,

I have the honour to refer to your despatch No. 373 of the 8th July 1911 on the subject of the regulations governing transport facilities for officers in the Protectorate.

I have in accordance with your instructions conferred with the Governor of Uganda to see if one set of regulations could be drawn up and made applicable to both Protectorates. I fear however that such a course is not practicable owing to the fact that the Uganda Railway does not run in Uganda and even were an agreement in general terms possible I think that the numerous differences would entail such a variety of explanatory footnotes, exceptions, additions and exemptions that a reference to them all would, in all probability, only lead to confusion. In these circumstances I have thought it advisable to frame regulations for this Protectorate only and have now the honour to transmit for sanction a revised schedule in which are em-

embodied all the amendments called for in the Treasury letter No. 10239/1911 of the 20th June 1911 which formed enclosure to your despatch under reply.

3. The only point which calls for special attention is the number of servants allowed to an officer when travelling.

4. I notice that the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury is not think it necessary to extend the privilege of three servants to unmarried officers but I would point out that there are certain Heads of Departments including a member of the Legislative Council who are unmarried and it would not appear to be desirable to differentiate by only allowing such officers two servants. I would therefore ask for a reconsideration of this ruling and trust that all officers may be allowed the free transport of three servants.

1. All officers are allowed free transport for their families, of which is meant wife and children, if that appointment, leave and orders, and also when travelling on local side leave. For the purpose of this regulation, the word "family" will be construed to mean the husband, wife and children.

2. The above specified amount of luggage to which officers are entitled are additional to the amount entitling the Railway free on each ticket. Officers are also allowed free transport for one horse or mule from Mombasa or place of purchase within the Protectorate, or for the nearest railway station, and in either vehicle alone, but not for servants.

(a) Officers are also allowed free transport of a horse or mule when travelling on official duty provided that the horse or mule is necessary for the performance of duty. Officers are also allowed free transport for one horse or mule from Mombasa or place of purchase within the Protectorate, or for the nearest railway station, and in either vehicle alone, but not for servants.

(b) When an officer's family proceeds with him on first a appointment, transfer, or on proceeding, or returning from leave, the same privilege will be granted as if they were accompanying the officer, provided that the total number of railway tickets and the limit of baggage, as set forth in these regulations, is not exceeded on the combined journeys of the officer and his family.

3. Railway horses may only be engaged for services when accompanying their master or their master's dependants, as provided in Item 4, except when officers are proceeding on leave or absence, one of the country when return warrants to the officer's last station may be issued.

4. Government agents and general rule of officials but in the case of officers employing European servants a 2nd class single carriage is granted for a private affair before the completion of a year of service are not

admitted.

5. Railway horses may only be engaged for services when accompanying their master or their master's dependants, as provided in Item 4, except when officers are proceeding on leave or absence, one of the country when return warrants to the officer's last station may be issued.
