

Sir,

With reference to my telegram No. 17 of the 24th ultimo and your cabled reply of the 29th idem regarding the appointment of a Postal Clerk and Telegraphist at a salary of £160 by £8 to £200 per annum to fill the vacancy arising on the resignation of Mr. G. H. Woodall, I venture to think that there is some misunderstanding as to the number of clerks to be appointed.

2. In my despatch No. 367 of the 7th of July 1911 I proposed a certain procedure in regard to the filling of the vacancy caused by the transfer of Mr. L. A. Harcourt to Nyasaland, as a result of which a new probationer would be required, and in my despatch No. 409 of the 2nd of July 1911 I reported that another vacancy from a probationer had occurred through the resignation of a locally engaged clerk. There were thus two vacancies for Postal Clerks and Telegraphists (probationers) at a commencing salary of £130, and two officers, viz. Moberg, Denton and Mayton, have just arrived to fill these posts. The resignation of Mr. Woodall has just been received and a further vacancy at a commencing salary of £160 by £8 to £200 per annum arises.

3. The Postmaster General is adverse to the immediate promotion of officers just appointed at salaries of £130 per annum to posts with salaries of £160 per annum having regard to the comparison effected with other officers of his staff. The authorised establishment of European male clerks in the Post Office, together with the 500 posts filling the different posts, is also in an enclosure which contemplates the promotion of Mr. Dyer to the Chief Clerkship with whom I am dealing in a separate despatch. It will be observed that the number of clerks on salary of £400 by the 1st April 1800 per annum is two hundred, and the number of probationers is one score, that is an authorized establishment. It is proposed to find employment for vacancies in the European service by the motion of a probationer, to be sent in at a late date, and to obtain a former or existing assistant officer from the British Post Office.

4. In order to avoid all contention it is necessary that a despatch comes from the British Post Office ~~by the 1st April~~ before the 1<sup>st</sup> April 1800, referring to the two clerks (Boardington and Bayley) who have just been appointed to the probationary grade. It is also desirable, in this case, to have no long delays which seem to be essential to the selection of a sufficient number of qualified men, in a manner as ordinary way. The work of the Department is rapidly

rapidly increasing and the Postmaster General  
represents the necessity of promptly filling  
vacancies, so keeping his staff up to full  
strength. In a recent circular the name of  
Mr. J. B. Watt of the Boston Post Office who has  
been causing direct employes as to Postal  
appointments in Boston is put forward. Prop  
osed to you for your consideration to be  
the suitable and preferable at least 27  
years of age, can receive telegrams and the rate  
of 10 words per minute and can be self-reliant,  
and of good character or the present Depart  
ment of the Post Office, Boston, Massachusetts
