Dear Colonel Seely,

I have not troubled you at all during these busy election times, but my first words must express my personal regret that the country is deprived (for the time being) of the able services which you have rendered in your official position.

A Our second steamer for the East Coast is about to sail, and so far we have not had support from the Crown Agents. They claim that we should guarantee them against the loss of their rebate from the British India Company if that rebate should be forfeited through their support of our Line. Now, seeing that we are incurring such heavy loss in undertaking this service, I must appeal to you to instruct the Crown Agents not to insist on this condition, for while I do not think the circumstances will arise, owing to my expectation that we shall be able to arrange amicably with the British India Company, yet it seems hard that they should say they will give us no cargo unless have this guarantee. I would look upon the

removal of this condition as a very small part of the general promise of support which you were good enough to give us when we entered upon this service without any definite guarantee... If you are disposed to take this view, then the Crown Agents could avoid the trouble of our steamer loading next month.
