My Lord:

Last week their Excellencies Herr Dernburg and Baron von Rechenberg, the Governor of German East Africa, stayed a day with me en route to the Victoria Nyanga. They were accompanied by Graf Henckel von Donnersmarck and Oberst deulant

deutnant Quade, whose appointment corresponds with that of Sir William Manning, five other members of their staffs and seven journalists.

Baron von Reichenberg had previously intimated that they wished to pay me an official visit and official honours were accorded to this party both in arrival and departure. A dinner was given to the principal official and non-official residents, and everything was done to make their short visit agreeable to them. I think they left well pleased with their reception.

Herr Dernburg's principal object in proceeding to the lake is of course in connection with Railway expansion in German East Africa. He was much impressed with the Uganda Railway, of which he frankly admitted the Germans were jealous, and told me we had done a grand work.

I gathered that the Tanga-Kilima Nyaro Railway, which has now reached Mombasa, will probably be extended as far as the lower slopes of Kilima Nyaro, but will not be projected further. It is on the extension of the main Dar es-Salam - Mogoro line that attention will be principally concentrated. This is to be extended to Tabora, the military centre 180 miles south of the lake, and Herr Dernburg and his party will now march from Muanza to Tabora with a view to determine its ultimate direction or directions from there.

5. These would naturally be to Muanza on lake Victoria and to Ujiji on lake Tanganyika and some point on the south end of that lake.
6. The Tabora - Muanza extension is

is the one that would affect us most, and I like it that it is Herr Dernburg's object to study the conditions of the lake traffic, and to see whether, in view of the position we have gained through the Uganda Railway and our steamers on the lake, a position which will be far stronger by the time a railway could reach Muanga, it would not be worth Germany's while to connect with the Victoria Nyanza, or whether other advantages could not be obtained by leaving this to us and prosecuting their schemes towards Lake Tanganyika.

b. As Herr Dernburg told me, there is ample room for railway expansion without either nation competing with the other, and it would seem from all I have heard, that of late he has somewhat modified his views as to a connection with

with the Victoria Nyanga upon which at one time he is said to have laid great stress.

There also appeared to be some idea by international or other means, of a connection through Taveta, between Von der railroad of the Uganda Railway, and Kilima Nyaro railway. It is difficult to see what the use of such a connection could be except to serve as the means of a flank move on the Uganda Railway which is now covered by the 40 miles of the waterless Serengeti plain, in the event of hostilities. I have noticed of late that one or two German parties have traversed this route it could not be with the object of diverting the

the date, bade off the Uganda Railway from Mombasa to Janga, because the distance would be much greater, and any such idea could be easily met by a reduction of rates from our to our port.

8. The conversations I had with Mr. Downing on general matters connected with the two territories were most interesting. He is taking a guide for German Administration on the Colonies and is anxious that the local officers should study English reports, and he evidently had no sympathy with what I may call the Sergeant Major system of German Administration which I have always thought to be a weak point in their dealings with the native races. He asked me many questions as to our policy with the natives, and thought it would be disadvantageous to have a uniform system of dealing with the
