Thru' the Inspector General of Police,

Sir,

I have the honour to submit herewith my proposed scheme for the working of the Paymaster's Department of the Police. By this system the European Staff, wherever stationed, and all men at Head-quarters, would be paid thru' my Office in the same manner as is at present in vogue in the 1st K.A. Rifles.

As regards outstations I beg to suggest that all expenditure incurred on account of the Police be charged in Station monthly Accounts with you to the heading "Police", and that all vouchers supporting such charges be sent direct to me by Officers in Charge of Stations. I think it would prevent queries if I would send me a monthly statement of totals charged against "Police" by each outstation so that I could check these totals with totals of vouchers sent to me direct by outstations before you rendered monthly accounts, with receipt and payment schedules, to me for allocation.

The only vouchers which would support your receipts and payment schedules would be Green Agents, Bowbag Agents, Treasury and Departmental vouchers, all outstation vouchers having previously been sent to me direct.

PROVISIONS MADE FOR THE PAYMENT OF EXPENSES.

Dr. B. A. PILLAI

ART. 16. EXPENSES MADE. The Paymaster shall deduct on his Paymaster's account for all expenses. He shall give the Paymaster cause to find out his expenses. If, G.O.'s for the year made up showed it did not accordingly.

All claims which shall be submitted brought to the Paymaster by the 1st day of every month to the Treasury on the 1st of every month for approval of payment. The amount of claims will then be a receipt by the Paymaster. Any claims after the 1st day of a month will be held over until the next month unless under exceptional circumstances.

ART. 17. EXPENSES MADE. DR. B. A. PILLAI AS PAYMASTER.

The Dr. B. A. Pillai will for the pay of their men from the Paymaster's own account for it to his monthly. The Paymaster will say the Article itself and any other expenditure incurred at Headquarters, he will give the cash to the Paymaster from the Treasury account, Madras.

ART. 18. EXPENSES MADE. DR. B. A. PILLAI AS PAYMASTER.

All expenses incurred on account of Police, (whether paid as part of other expenditure) shall be charged in monthly statement each brought to the headquarter "Police" and the Paymaster will be sent directly to the Paymaster. Dr. Pillai therefore rendering monthly statement monthly will be that all expenses incurred charge against the Police, in G.O.s monthly and accounts, for and direct to the Paymaster.

The A.D.C.P. as Paymaster, does not to draw account on the Paymaster will send his quarterly account to the Paymaster.

REVENUE RECEIVED AND EXPENDED DURING THE MONTH.
Copies
copies of all Police and Revenue dues pay will be
published in the Inspector General's daily order book;
and this book will be the Inspector's only authority
for paying each station will contribute its proportion. The
daily order book will also be the Inspector's authority
for making transfers of men from one station to
another.

Payments (a supply of which will be sent to each
station and will supersede the payment as present in
use) will be rendered to the Inspector, in Capitano,
sub, and Officers in Charge of Police detachments will,
see that all men are on duty and cannot be paid in
the end of the month, a note should be made on the pay-
sheet to this effect, and the man's pay should appear
in the next month's paybook. All Police volunteers should
be compensated to the Inspector from contributions not
less than the Pay of each month.

In cases where men are transferred from one station
to another a Last Pay certificate should accompany them. Each Officer in Charge of Police detach-
ments will be supplied with forms for this purpose.

The Inspector will be responsible that no station
exceeds the authorized votes.

Thru' the Inspector General of Police.

Sir,

With reference to our recent conversation regarding the bringing of the pay of Indian & Native N. C. O's & men on to a fixed scale without showing an increase on the present rates for pay of Police, I have the honour to submit the following rates for your consideration which show a total saving of £137 based on the present year's estimates.

As men at present serving in the force have been recruited under the Police Ordinance (23 of 1906) for a period of 5 years on various rates of pay, differing in

many instances from the above rates, I would propose that their substantive pay be shown at the above rates & the difference between their current rates & the above rates be shown as Good conduct pay (the new pay sheet which you approved, adapts itself to this). - Within the next 3 years these odd rates of pay would disappear and if men drawing these rates wished to re-arrange they could do so under the new rates.

The present scale of pay for N.C., 2nd & Constables is, I think, far from satisfactory as, for instance, a man is liable to transfer from one station to another and if recruited in a part of the country where the present pay of a constable is Rs.9/- & is afterwards transferred to another district where the pay is Rs.16, he finds himself in the position of drawing little more than half the pay of the other constables in the station for no other reason than that he happened to be recruited at say, Kitui. The enclosed letter received from the A.D.S.P. Mombasa will illustrate the present state of affairs.

Certain stations such as Mombasa, Rabai, Tsaita and Taveta would have, at the beginning, a preponderance of 1st class constables owing to the fixed rates of pay for constables at these stations being Rs.16 but this would adjust itself in course of time as men are transferred from one station to another. It would also open an avenue of promotion for 2nd & 3rd grade constables.

Under the above proposed system if a man on Rs.9 was sent to a station where the other constables were drawing Rs.16 or Rs.18 he would go there as a 3rd grade constable.

constable. A system of chevrons, according to grade, would convey this to the native mind & thus avoid any risk of discontent as regards pay - I think the present system must strongly tend to misunderstanding among the men re regards pay.

Good conduct pay

The question of good conduct pay also requires to be reorganised. At present there is no qualification laid down under which a man is entitled to Good conduct pay of Rs.1 per mensem & officers grant G.C. pay at their own discretion, in some cases before a man has completed six months service - My suggested remedy is that, as the period of enlistment in the Police is for 5 years, no man should be considered as entitled to G.C. Pay until he has completed one year without an entry in his defaulters sheet, subsequent G.C. badges to be in the proportion of one to every further period of 2 years service without an entry in defaulters sheet.

I shall be glad to know whether I may draft regulations concerning scale of pay & good conduct pay, together with a regulation covering the question of Orderly Room rates being credited to the General Police Fund, as discussed with you last week, for insertion in the Police Ordinance.


I have fully discussed this scheme with

I have had some time now when I might be allowed
to drop names as they are all, with the exception of
one or two, in a general position. In the case of
the members they may be obtained from the Green Books
of the per capita vehicle tax which is paid to districts and I
