My Lord,

With reference to Your Lordship's Circular of October 8th forwarding for publication a copy of the Order in Council 11 certifying regulations as to the removal and return of Chinese and Indian lunatics under the provisions of the Colonial Lunatics Removal Act, I have the honor to invite Your Lordship's attention to the fact that this Act has never been applied to this Protectorate and it would therefore be difficult to implement the Order-in-Council.

Sir,

I have the honour to request that I may be informed as to whether "The Colonial Prisoners Removal Order in Council 1907" has been communicated in this Protectorate under instructions from the Secretary of State; and if so whether in those instructions any information was given as to when the Colonial Prisoner Removal Act 1884 was applied to this Protectorate.

That Act applies to all territories and places being part of His Majesty's dominions and to such other places in which His Majesty has jurisdiction to which the Act may from time to time be applied by an Order in Council.

So far as your Excellency's Act has never been applied to this Protectorate and therefore the promulgation of the Order in Council referred to would appear to be somewhat premature.

It is however highly desirable that the Act should be applied at the earliest opportunity and I recommend that unless His Excellency can give me information on the subject which has not been received or he should direct the attention of the Secretary of State to the matter in order that steps may be taken to obtain the promulgation of the Order in Council under section 15 of the Act.
