Salaries.

Sir,

Referring to your letter No. 14736/1907 dated the 4th May last, I have the honour to state that the "Regulations for the employment of Officers in the British Protectorates in -- Uganda and the East Coast of Africa", in my possession, provide that:

(Para. 8)

"In the event of an Officer proceeding on accumulated leave he will be paid the full salary of his post for the first three months, and for the remaining period one quarter of his salary will be deducted for the purpose of providing an allowance for his substitute". -

2. It would thus appear that the object of the deduction is to meet the cost of such assistance as may be required to carry on the duties of the absentee. -

3. Since in connection with Mr. Jeaffreson's leave no additional expenditure has been incurred I request the Earl of Elgin may under the circumstances be pleased to sanction the savings on his salary being either divided among the Staff, on whom extra work was thrown, or being refunded to Mr. Jeaffreson. -
