If my proposals are approved I would
 suggest that Mr. G. Reynor, who is
 now in Normandy, be appointed
 Treasury Assistant. This gentleman,
 whose application has already been filed
 in the Colonial Office, has already acted
 temporarily in my Department when
 he gave complete satisfaction.

My principal reason for suggesting
 the creation of such European posts
 that with a branch Treasury to
 maintain, one of which is in the
 unhealthy Hebron Division, I have
 at least found it entirely sufficient
 to make the necessary arrangements of
 staff. A few months ago, after two
 of my staff had been necessarily
 recalled from Hebron. I had to
 consider the necessity of temporarily
 closing the Hebron Treasury, which
 would have caused great inconvenience.

The mission was, however, obtained
for the temporary employment of
Mr. Byron and the closure of the
Grant heavy Charity situated.

It would be most convenient if
Mr. Byron could be appointed from
April 1st especially if any visit
to Bombay is decided upon. The
increased cost would only be £22 above
the estimate as they were stated and
this could easily be met from savings
or leave pay etc.


With reference to Mr. Antrobus's letter of the 1st instant (3193/1906-07), I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to state, for the information of the Earl of Alvin, that They sanction payment to Mr. Pestonjee Jamssetjee Mehta, head Clerk in the Treasury of the East Africa Protectorate, of a pension of £64 per annum from Protectorate funds.

My Lords regret that They are unable to agree to the grant of the proposed special pension to Mr. Mehta, as it would be contrary to Their established practice in the administration of the Superannuation Acts

Sir,

I am directed by the Secretary of State for the Colonies to inform you that subject to your being passed as physically fit for service, he proposes to select you for probationary appointment as Treasurer Assistant in the E.A.P.

with salary at the rate of £ 250 p. a. ~~annually~~ ~~of £ 210~~ ~~to £ 400~~ and free quarters or an allowance in lieu thereof.

2. A memorandum showing the general conditions attached to appointments in the Protectorate is enclosed herewith, but you are to understand that you will be subject to any regulations which may hereafter be introduced by or with the sanction of the Secretary of State.

A copy of the regulations as to pensions is also enclosed.

4. If you are prepared to accept the appointment on these conditions, you should present yourself to one of the medical officers of the

This Department, whose names are given on the annexed letter, for the purpose of being medically examined. The letter is to be detached and sent as it left with him, and you will be required to pay him a fee of one guinea.

He will send his report direct to this Department.
