Sir,

The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have had before Them Mr. Antrobus's letter (1196/1906-7) of the 12th instant, forwarding the Estimates of the British East Africa Protectorate for the year 1907/8, and I am to request that you will submit to the Earl of Elgin the following reply.

The estimates for 1906/7 as finally approved after allowing (1) for the special addition of £10,000 for Public Works, sanctioned by Treasury Letter (1422/06) of the 20th August last and (ii) for an adjustment of £15,182 on each side, to arrive at a fair comparison with 1907/8 were as follows:

Expenditure	£ 616,994
Revenue	390,646
Deficiency	£226,348
Grant in Aid	£154,000

The estimates for 1907/8 as originally submitted by the Commissioner contemplated an expenditure of £ 872,764, a revenue of £ 564,713, and a deficiency of £318,051, which deficiency it was proposed to meet for the most part out of the large accumulated balances, leaving £117,500 to be provided by a Grant in Aid.

The Earl of Elgin, however, did not feel able to recommend these figures to Their Lordships, inasmuch as, since the occurrence of so large a balance in hand could not be anticipated, their acceptance would have involved a very largely increased demand on the Imperial Exchequer for 1908/9.

His Lordship has therefore reduced the proposed expenditure by some £34,000 to a figure which represents the amount allowable under the half-and-half principle, with the addition, which My Lords are willing to allow as a special case, of the surplus earnings of the Uganda Rail-way for 1906/7, estimated at £81,411.

The estimates accordingly are submitted at the following totals :-

Expenditure	781,559
Revenue	547,392
Deficiency	£234,177

This deficiency is to be met as to £153,000 by the grant in aid (which has already been included in the estimate of the Vote for Colonial Services) and as to the remainder from balances.

My Lords readily acknowledge the co-operation of the Secretary of State in the policy which they have in view, namely the progressive dissolution of the colonies of the African Protectorates on the British taxpayer; and, having regard to the careful scrutiny to which the original estimates have been submitted, They accept His Lordship's proposals as they stand, subject to the ensuing observations which will be confined to the more salient points.

REVENUE.

The estimate of revenue shows a highly satisfactory expansion of £166,746, or about 43%, the principal items of increase being Railway Receipts, £119,600, Interest Revenue, £32,000, and Customs £12,000, while the only decrease (under the head of Land Sales) is one the reasons for which entirely commend themselves to this Board.

EXPENDITURE.

The total increase of £164,575 is accounted for to the extent of some £130,000 under the heads of Railway (including Special Expenditure) and Public Works Extra-ordinary, the net increase under the remaining heads amounting to some £35,000 (after allowing for savings, mainly under the heads of Port and Marine, Special Expenditure (£2420), Military (£15,600), and Post Office, Special Expenditure (£4,000)).

Head 2. Their Lordships offer no objection to the grant of a duty allowance of £500 per annum to the officer actually administering the Government, on the understanding that the existing privileges of the Commissioner as regards Customs duties and passages will be discontinued.

In assenting to the establishment proposed under the Subhead native affairs (on an unsatisfactory basis), Their Lordships presume that any expenditure incurred directly on behalf of private employers of labour will be recovered.

Port and Marine.

Their Lordships note with dissatisfaction the shape expressed that it may be found possible at a future date to provide

provide by contract with a private firm for the work now done at such heavy cost by the S.S. "Daba".

Police.

In view of the very substantial savings to be effected under the head of Military, My Lords will not object to the institution of a European Police Force to which some £1000 of the India ~~allowance~~ this Head is attributable.

Education.

The provision under this Head is confined to items of which My Lords are already cognisant. They assume that they will be informed of any contemplated developments in due course.

Military and Military Special Expenditure.

My Lords take note of the large reductions (^{£1,452 and £1,179 respectively}) under these heads, due to the despatch of two Companies of the 1st Battalion Royal African Rifles to Zanzibar, and to the reduction of each of the Battalions by two Companies.

Railway Department.

The increases of £25 in the salary of Messrs Wilson, Stanley and Gallagher are sanctioned; and provision may be made for 3 officers for each of 2 steamers until 1st September, and for each of 4 thereafter.

In sanctioning this Head at £58,200 Their Lordships note that the apparent inconsistency between the letters from your Department of 21st December and 21st February last is explained by the fact that the proposals of Mr. Churchill's memorandum, though not to be regarded as superseded, are

Police.

In view of the very substantial savings to be effected under the head of Military, My Lords will not object to the institution of a European Police Force to which some £4000 of the income under this Head is attributed.

Education.

The provision under this Head is confined to items of which My Lords are already cognisant. They assume that they will be informed of any contemplated developments in due course.

Military and Military Special Expenditure.

My Lords take note of the large reductions (£14,452 and £1,179 respectively) under these heads, due to the despatch of two Companies of the 1st Battalion King's African Rifles to Zanzibar, and to the reduction of the 3rd Battalion by 2 Companies.

Admiralty Department.

The increase of £25,171 in the salary of Messrs Wilson, Stanley and Shattock are sanctioned and provision may be made for 3 officers for each of 3 steamers until 1st September, and for each of 4 thereafter.

Railway. Special Expenditure.

In sanctioning this Head at £58,200 Their Lordships note that the apparent inconsistency between the letters from your Department of 21st December and 21st February last is explained by the fact that the proposal of Mr. Churchill's memorandum, though not to be regarded as superseded, etc.

pro tanto postponed owing to the exigencies of the time.

The only new items under this head are £3,200 excess on the new cargo boat (covered by savings on the S.S. Clement Hall) and the construction of a wharf at Port Florence to cost £15,000 (of which £10,000 will be met from savings).

Agricultural Department.

I am to say that, before definitely sanctioning the expenditure proposed, My Lords would be glad to be furnished with a copy of Mr. Mac Donald's report on the Department which it would seem is being reorganised and extended.

Forestry and Scientific Departments.

My Lords approve salaries of £800 - 50 - £1000 for the Conservator of Forests, and of £500 for the Game Ranger: the subsidy to the Trout Acclimatisation Society should be limited to a single grant of £100 as proposed.

Survey Department.

The estimate is provisionally approved at £17,853 (£12,000 + £3,000 special). My Lords must ask that the details of how £3,000 extra may be submitted for their confirmation when we meet.

Public Works.

The provision asked for wages of the roads and paths as follows will meet for the current year:

My Lords cannot but express Their regret that the demands under this head should show so considerable an increase

increase: but, having regard to the large reductions made by the Secretary of State in the original estimate and to the rapid expansion of the Protectorate, They are prepared as a special case to approve the amounts proposed, in the hope that this liberal provision will go far towards bringing the Protectorate abreast of immediate requirements and pave the way for a reduced expenditure under these heads in future years.

The deficiency between revenue and expenditure as stated above, being £234,177, and the grant-in-aid £133,000, it will be necessary to make ends meet, to draw upon balances to the extent of £81,177. There will then remain a surplus balance of £123,554, as to the disposal of which a separate letter will be addressed to your Department.
