There is some confusion as to the

Sir,

I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to reply to Mr. Antrobus's letter (6484/1907) of the 24th ultimo in which the Earl of Egin recommends the appointment of a Deputy-Principal Registrar of Documents in the East Africa Protectorate, with salary of £250 + 10 - £350 per annum, with pension rights.

The European Staff of the Court in East Africa is shown in the Estimates for 1906/7 as follows:

Registrar of High Court and Principal Registrar of Documents	£400
Deputy Registrar	£200 - 10 - £300

In the estimates for the current year the Deputy Registrar on the above scale is replaced by a Deputy Registrar of Documents £250 - 15 - £350.

It would appear from the correspondence ~~has~~ before Their Lordships that sanction is asked for the appointment of a Deputy (or Deputy Principal) Registrar of documents in addition to, not in substitution for, the Deputy Registrar provided for in last year's estimates.

To this addition My Lords, in the circumstances explained, offer no objection. But They consider that

the scale of the Deputy Registrar of documents should not exceed that of the other Deputy Registrars, viz:- £200 - 10 - £300, and give their sanction accordingly.

I am directed by the Secretary of State for the Colonies to inform you that, subject to your being passed as physically fit for service, he proposes to select you for probationary appointment as Deputy Registrar of the High Court in the S.A.P.

with salary at the rate of £200 p.a. by annual increments of £10 up to £300 p.a., and free quarters or an allowance in lieu thereof.

A memorandum showing the general conditions attached to appointments in the Protectorate is enclosed herewith, but you are to understand that you will be subject to any regulations which may hereafter be made by or with the sanction of the Secretary of State. Some of the regulations as to pensions are also enclosed.

3. If you are prepared to accept the appointment on these conditions, you should present yourself to one of the medical advisers of this Department, whose names are given on the annexed letter, for the purpose of being medically examined. The letter is to be detached and left with him; and you will be required to pay him a fee of one guinea. He will send his report direct to this Department.
