Dear Sir,

Our clients or ours have been approached with regard to two concessions in the East African Protectorate, which they are informed have been granted - one to Mr. R. T. Hancock and the other to Mr. E. K. Abbott. These concessions are alleged to be of 50 square miles for the purpose of working Sansevieria Fibre, and are situated in the district of Malindi on the South Bank of the Sabaki River.

Our clients are informed that application has been made, and survey fee paid, and that upon a deposit of £1,000 in the case of each concession a lease in a form similar to that issued to the Afro-American Coy., will be granted, the condition being that within 3 years £2,500 is spent on the development of each of the concessions.

Our clients are quite willing to find the necessary capital for the working of these two properties as soon as they have had the same inspected by their own experts, and can be satisfied that upon the conditions stated being fulfilled leases will be issued to Mr. Hancock and to Mr. Abbott or to their nominees. Before, however, sending experts from this country

to inspect the properties our clients desire some assurance that the statements made on behalf of Mr. Hancock and Mr. Abbott as to the granting of the concessions and the future issue of the leases are correct, and we are instructed therefore to ask you whether the Colonial Office can confirm the statements made; that is to say whether the concessions have been granted and the charter fees paid.
