I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 409 of 8th ultimo regarding the non-payment by German firms of Stamp Duty on Insurance Policies.

2. So long as the East Africa Protectorate is subject to the Treaty with the Sultan of Zanzibar, foreign powers will not recognise our local regulations unless it suits their purpose; and the Stamp Act which is applied here and which compels British merchants to affix an Inland Revenue Stamp on their marine policies is not binding on the German firms. 
