the Estimates must be submitted
to the Council before they are
submitted for the approval
of the Treasury

Articles XXVI and XXVIII (3) of the Instructions of the 9th November last seem to be the only ones that refer, and that but indirectly, to control to be exercised by the Legislative Council over the Protectorate estimates.

The Estimates will I presume have to be laid before, and considered by the Council, but their preparation is now a lengthy process and I am anxious that no time should be wasted by unnecessary discussion in Council, which may have the effect of delaying their transmission to the Secretary of State. If it is in order I think a short despatch, with particular reference to the Estimates, instructing me that the Council is an ~~advisory~~ one, would strengthen my hands. If, however, it be thought that this might be considered an unnecessary restriction of the Order in Council or the Instructions of the 9th November, I say nothing further. The Estimates will, I presume, be considered by the Council, and I hope that they will be transmitted to the Secretary of State, It would never do to lay them before the Council, for consideration, after they have been approved by the Secretary of State.
