I have the honor to return
the letter of 22 June 1905 referred to in para 2, and to
most sincerely apologise. no opportunity was
given me for meeting the statement that caused
it. I therefore had written to express my regret
at that undeserved censure while at the same time
called on to finish a large survey over an estimated
distance of Ireland for less than £1500.—
Thinking that I was about the interest in opinion
of the Colonial Office in my work, I resigned, giving
very ample notice in regard to safety of myself
& myself being away... in case necessity after my
return... under the circumstances no other
choice was left to me.

had I thought otherwise I should have stated my
willingness to continue work under the railway manager
I would have been required to leave at once, or continue
working directly under the Commissioner of Railways
until I could report that sufficient work had
been done.

There is now no suspicion whatever
on the part of any but myself. & I have always
described it to all friends the necessity for doing
so. The regards para 3 I myself after the attention
the Colonial Office gave my statement had apparently
and not been referred to. —

I regret that I am unable to agree with the
accusing in para 2 in the charge against which
I was forced away from my work at Kinsale
the railway manager's conduct against my own welfare
in regard to loss of health

and only left in agreement with him that I should consult the medical officer at Labbikie about my eyes (I was otherwise quite well again) & advised by him the manager took the agreement of consulting the medical officer before I could make time, asking him to state whether I should go to Karrik or England thus disbarring the question of his medical advice — my eye had been examined several times at Karrik & was practically well when I got to Port Said, thus proving that it only wanted to be let alone. I had no cataract, nor was any special treatment required or given me.

I consider my illness there was caused by the way in which I had to work to suit the manager's convenience.

I had very little sickness between 1903 & 1905, and none since.

The trip home was very agreeable, touring the soft, no stone at Durango, going very easily during my absence. I lost about £100 worth of private instruments & tools through their exposure to the rainy season —

As regards my admitting the return home had benifited my health — a top home would of course, benefit anyone, well or ill, that had one for 20 months in the Argentine as I had, still I don't want to call in good health & in better shape are entitled to full pay leave after last person (all assessment).

I take a counter stand. In that we have a right return to England this the absence of our exiled brush very much ruined my pay continuoing unpaid, could not have been paid in at all & therefore, the right stand, stand what is stated to be full salary, should have been obtained by me personally.

I beg you to pay much account and
in settling up all parties claims on the Colonial
Office, have the honor to repeat that I
have received and have considered
the orders in their letter of 20 June 1905 — as
far as my estimate ever intended in full
compliance with my original instructions from
the Design Office — without the excess £500
referred to in this account having been
asked for by the manager of the railway, &
not by me.
