Sir,

I have had the honour to receive your despatch
No. 417 of the 15th Ultimo enclosing correspondence
showing the terms on which His Majesty's Government
is prepared to assist the East Africa Syndicate in
the exploitation of the soda deposit at Lake Magadi.

2. While expressing his satisfaction at the rates
of half-penny a ton per mile down, and one penny a
ton per mile up offered to the Syndicate, Mr. Currie
is of the opinion that, in view of the probable
decrease of the Railway Earnings on general traffic
below eighty-two pence per train mile, consequent
on the inevitable further reduction of rates in the
future,

2. In estimating the expenses at 51.50 annas per
train mile Mr. Currie did not mean to imply that this
was the lowest possible figure for operating ~~this~~

railway. He merely to convey that in making an

estimate for carrying all the native traffic, it

was at the same time a very reasonable figure

to go on, and one which may be improved upon when in

the course of years the country has attained a higher

stage of development.
