I am glad to state, for the info of the Lt of the Treasury, that the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate has reported that owing to a great increase in the number of cases of malaria in the district of Naivasha hospital which could not have been foreseen when the current estimates were framed, it is necessary to appoint an extra assistant and that in order to improve the supervision of the hospital it is desirable to appoint a Medical Officer and to entrust the latter with in addition to ordinary medical duties.

2. The Governor states that he is unable to recommend any of the present staff for appointment as Medical Officer and asks that a Medical Officer be appointed.
