With reference to paragraph 3 of Lord Elgin's despatch No. 684 of the 20th December last on the subject of assimilating the patterns of uniform to be worn by the Police of the Uganda and East Africa Protectorates I have the honour to report that the Adjutant and Pay and Quarter-Master of the East Africa Police met the Inspector General and the Deputy Inspector General of the Uganda Police at Kampala, and the Committee thus formed came to a unanimous decision as to the patterns to be adopted for both Protectorates which have been approved by Mr. Hesketh Bell and myself.

2. A copy of Captain Smith's and Mr. Gamble's report, together with particulars of the needed patterns decided upon, is enclosed.

3. The only point of difference with the Inspector General King's African Rifles, who approved of the rest of the patterns, was in connection

connection with the red Cummerbund, for which he thought it would be advisable to substitute red cuffs to the sleeves.

Subsequent correspondence with Uganda, however, showed that strong objections were raised by the Inspectors Generals of Police in both Protectorates to the red cuffs, which would be liable to run in wet weather and look unsightly. Mr. H. Bell and myself have therefore decided to adhere to the red Cummerbund, as originally proposed by the Committee.

I have the honour to inform you that in accordance ^{Ref. J. 08} with your instructions the Acting Adjutant and myself have discussed the question of assimilating, as far as possible, the uniforms of the East Africa and Uganda Police Forces, with the Inspector General Uganda Police and we have decided on patterns as per attached statement which we trust meets with your approval.

In order to avoid any risk of men of the King's African Rifles being mistaken for Police, or vice-versa, we have, you will observe, suggested the adoption of a red Cummerbund and this together with the high-collard blouse with regimental numbers on the collar and black Jersey, will completely do away with any such question. Our great-coat, whistle lanyards and waterproof capes and duty badges further prevent any such mistake from arising.

As regards the blouse. The Inspector General, Uganda Police has adopted the East Africa Police pattern on trial as he is not sure whether the high collar will cause ~~extreme~~ distress of the Uganda Protectorate.

For ~~local~~ reasons the Jersey is not used by the Uganda Police as it has been found to attract a dangerous tick which exists in the Uganda Protectorate.

Waterproof capes are also only used by the East Africa Police - the latter being issued to Coast Stations instead of garrisons, owing to the heat and very heavy rains. Shaglis and boots are likewise peculiar to the E.A. Police.

the latter being issued to Indian Police only and African Police at Baringo Station where the ground is too stony for chaplaries. Chaplaries are necessary, as you are aware, in the East Africa Protectorate for safari purposes.

The Inspector General Uganda Police has written separately to His Excellency the Governor, Entebbe, informing him regarding the above and I have the honour to request that you will be good as to forward the attached list to His Excellency the Governor, Nairobi, should you approve of same, with the request that it be forwarded as soon as possible to the Colonial Office as the July issue of clothing etc. for the E.A. Police has already been put back three months and unless particulars as to patterns are in the Crown Agents hands at an early date they cannot comply with demands and it is most important that the clothing and equipment should be ready for issue in East Africa on July 1st.

I would point out that frogs and bandoliers cannot be obtained until it is decided whether the Police are to have the .303 or .450 weapon. This question also holds up the obtaining of ammunition and spare parts of rifles from England unless a decision is soon arrived at the Police, who for the past year in succession, will have to forego the annual Musketry course, the importance of which I need not draw your attention to.
