Refers to the legal question which I raised in my letter of 10th June 1908, it appears that Mr. Chatterton was duly appointed Receiver of Mr. Teachers effects by order of the Court dated 31 January 1908. It then appointed Mr. Green Advocate solicitor to the receiver to administer it, which should be done according to the reading we made of the Indian Act 25 of 1858. It does not however appear that there was no furnished the inventory or account necessary required by Sec 15 of the Act or coupled with the order that he should furnish the Court with a report on the business affairs within 2 months from the date of his receiving the effects. It appears the Court seem to have taken steps to enforce the delivery of that report or the inventory or accounts (see 18 sec of the Act).

Next subsequent Paper

## MINUTE.

WITH REFERENCE to C.O. despatch re Mr. R.A.H. Davies  
land at Kau and Kiahsu.

On the 15th of January 1906 Mr. Davies was deceased  
after the inquiry declared under section 103 of Indian Act 35 of  
1898 by Judge Carter. On the 1st February 1906 Judge Carter  
appointed Mr. Administrator General (Judge Clatterbuck)  
Administrator of his person and manager of his property  
and estates. On the 2nd February 1906 Mr. Davies' estate  
was sold at auction and the amount realized Rs. 3000.  
shortly he was only creditor in the Proterteree and it was  
said at auctioneers that he had in administration Mr. Davies'  
estate and ~~realized~~ that Mr. Clatterbuck was a friend  
of Mr. Davies and should be appointed which was done on the 15th  
January 1906. Similarly Mr. Clatterbuck appointed Mr. G.  
of Wood and Cole to manage for him. On 13th May 1906 an  
account of the same information in Mr. Davies' estate  
rendered. In December 1906 as Judge Clatterbuck  
had been unable to get the necessary documents from  
the Government of India he sent a copy of the same  
to Mr. Davies' son Mr. Davies' son has  
not yet returned the same. A copy of the statement of the intro-  
wishes in the estate up to the beginning of this year.  
In this further statement the manner in which the Rs. 3000  
mentioned in the C.O. despatch has been dealt with is shown.  
These accounts will be audited early next month. It  
appears that at the time when Mr. Davies made his will  
he had not paid the purchase price for the 640 acre farm  
which had to be paid for out of his estate. This amounted  
to Rs. 1280 and the property realized Rs. 3000 which left a

profit to the estate in Rs.1720 and considering the large amount of debt due by the estate to W.M. in the interest of Mr. Packes that this property should have been sold.

As regards para 7 of the A.D. I state I have already explained that Mead & Co were appointed to act as law agent for Mr. Clutterbuck and when Mr. Packes' brother was here last year he saw and spoke to Mr. Harrison and never took any objection to him so acting. He also called on Judge Hamilton and did not express dissatisfaction with anything that had been done but enquired only as to whom all belonging to his brother. As to who may have been attorney made. As regards para 8 of the A.D. (which you may notice) that Judge Hamilton who was then administrator general was appointed in his absence to be manager to Mr. Clutterbuck's estate that he did not accept the appointment and between an finding out the position had the order cancelled and Mr. Clutterbuck appointed in his place under Indian Act (36) of 1850.

I, the undersigned William John Ramsford, M.R.C.S.,  
England, L.R.C.P. London, Medical Officer, East Africa  
Protectorate, hereby certify that I on the 14th day  
of January 1905 at about 11.0 p.m. examined Mr. W.H.  
Fawkes at the residence of A. Linton Fox, Director of  
Agriculture, East Africa Protectorate, and that the  
said Mr. <sup>R.H.</sup> Fawkes is a person to be taken in charge  
of, and retained under care and treatment; and that  
I have formed this opinion on the following grounds:-

1. That he considers that acts proved to have been committed by a person 6 years ago have been alleged by sundry persons unknown to have been committed by him within the last three days; also, he states that I have attempted to poison him by the administration of one sleeping draught, whereas I have seen him run twice within the last 12 months, and am a comparative stranger to him, and that the two letters written unaddressed to me by him in explanation of his refusal to take the draught in question contain matter quite irrelevant, and couched in disconnected and pedantic language; also he has threatened me with a loaded revolver.
2. All facts indicating insanity communicated to me by:- H. Eastwood, Esq., Chief Accountant Uganda Railway, whom he accused of want of hospitality when entertained by him at dinner; he was violent on this occasion and was ~~not~~ ejected from the house.
3. A. Armitstead, Esq., Paymaster, 3rd K.A.R.F.L., whom

on the 10th instant at night, he threatened with a loaded revolver  
but did not promise to say he was "not mad". Mr.  
Armitage had never met Mr. Fawkes before.

J. J. Sturdy, Esq., Chief Veterinary Officer, E.A. Protective  
Corporation, whom he assaulted without warning in the Nairobi  
Club, and threw under the billiard table.

Clinton, Esq., Director of Agriculture, who wrote to me  
on the night in question that "Fawkes is mad" and helped  
to restrain him until he was placed under certified  
restraint.

E Conant Esq., Assistant Collector and Mr. Stocker, Survey  
Department, who disarmed him when he threatened all the  
guests at a dinner party with a loaded revolver on the  
11th instant.

E Waring, Esq., Assistant Chief Surveyor, who assisted in  
restraining him on the 11th instant.

Mr. Goldreich settler reported to me that Mr. Fawkes sat  
up during the night of the 10th instant with a loaded  
revolver, and carried on an animated conversation with  
some supposed person. Mr. Fawkes was alone that night.

B. Bremner Esq., Assistant Local Superintendent, has also  
no statement regarding Mr. Fawkes' stuporiness or  
otherwise.

Many of the above have known Fawkes for 5 years.

- (4) Mr. Fawkes' credit balance at the National Bank of India in Bombay stands at Rs. 1000/- and his outstanding bills amount to upwards of Rupees 1000.
- (5) His other property consists of interests in land which Mr. Clutterbuck is peculiarly fitted to supervise.
- (6) The Bank certificate of Mr. Fawkes' account at this date is attached herewith and marked A.
- (7) Dr. Bedford, Medical Officer, has today reported to me that steps should be taken to send Mr. Fawkes to England under care of an attendant at the earliest

opportunity, he having this day examined him.


