I have the honour to transmit herewith a copy of a letter which I have received from the Treasurer with reference to the leave conditions prevailing in the Protectorate.

2. The diversity at present existing might, I think, be well removed and the same leave rules be applied to all European appointments on the permanent staff. As regards the leave conditions attaching to temporary agreements, I have the honour to invite a reference to the ruling contained in Lord Elgin's despatch No. 22 of the 15th January last, regarding the leave to be granted to Assistant Engineers on temporary engagements, by which they are to receive 6 months' leave after 30 months' service and 3 months' leave if not re-engaged.

3. I consider that it would be advisable to grant a similar privilege to all officers on temporary agreements and trust that Your Lordship will sanction this being done in future.

Sir,

I have the honour to bring to your notice the great diversity of conditions as to leave which exists at present in regard to Europeans in the Protectorate service and to suggest for your consideration the advisability of obtaining sanction for the adoption of a scheme which would abolish the present anomalies and obviate the necessity of referring to the Colonial Office the questions which are constantly arising out of the claims for leave by Europeans.

2. In regard to officers on the permanent staff there are two sets of Regulations bearing upon the question of leave, namely "Regulations for the Employment of officers in the East Africa, Uganda and Somaliland Protectorates" (African No. 775) and "Subordinate Staff leave Regulations" of January 31st 1902.

With minor exceptions these Regulations are the same to-day as when originally issued in the

early

early days of the Protectorate. But the state of affairs has changed greatly since then. When these Regulations were issued there were practically no Europeans on the Subordinate Staff, and the Subordinate Staff Regulations were intended only for non-Europeans.

3. With the development of the country it was found to be not only possible but desirable to employ Europeans in posts for which formerly only non-Europeans were available, and in consequence a considerable number of Europeans are now engaged locally subject to the Subordinate Staff Regulations. I may observe that in the case of Messrs. Reilly and Hadden, who were transferred from the Royal Irish Constabulary to the Subordinate Staff of the South Africa Police, the Belgian Orties mentioned leave on the scale allowed to officers of the superior establishment, whereas other officers of similar standing have been granted only the leave allowed to non-Europeans. It will be readily understood that this is regarded as a grievance, and I venture to express the hope that it will be found possible to allow to all Europeans on the permanent staff the scale of leave which at present is granted to the superior establishment only.

4. As regards officers serving under special agreements or holding temporary appointments, the ~~conditions~~

conditions as to leave are almost perplexing in their variety. Some officers are serving under temporary agreements or appointments entitling them to the benefit of the ordinary Leave Regulations, the agreements of others do not stipulate for any leave, some are entitled to a stated amount of leave on the expiry of their agreements whether they re-engage or not, and others are entitled to a stated amount of leave if they do not re-engage and a different amount if they do re-engage, whilst in the case of some it is stated that if they wish to re-engage the terms will be such as may be mutually agreed upon. In addition to this many officers have, by special sanction, been given leave which was not in strict accordance with the terms of their agreements.

Mr. As you are aware a general authority has been received from the Colonial Office in regard to the leave of temporary Engineers in the Public Works Department. I enclose for ready reference a copy of the Memorandum which you will observe that after 3<sup>o</sup> months' service an Engineer receives 6 months' leave if he is not re-engaged, and 3 months' leave if he is not re-engaged. I have the honour to suggest that these terms be made applicable to all Europeans holding temporary appointments.

Sir,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 520 of the 6th of December, and to inform you that I approve of your recommendation that Mr. Sykes, Assistant Engineer in the Public Works Department, should be regarded as entitled to first class passages and that the difference between the cost of a first and a second class passage, which he himself paid on his voyage to East Africa, should be refunded to him.

2. The provision as to leave contained in Mr. Birch's agreement was that he should receive, after thirty months' service, six months leave of absence if he was to be re-engaged for further service and three months leave if he was not to be re-engaged. This provision should apply to Mr. Sykes, and also to Mr. Greenwell and other Executive or Assistant Engineers who may be engaged or re-engaged in the future.

3. I do not consider, however, that it is essential that a fresh Agreement should be prepared to cover these modifications in the terms of Mr. Sykes' engagement, and it will be sufficient if he is informed that he will be entitled to first class passages and to leave on the scale mentioned in the preceding paragraph.
