EAST AFRICA PROTECTORATE.

September 17th 1908.

My Lord,

I received yesterday a deputation of the  
Gomnese Community who came to see me on the question  
of the Education of the Gomnese children in Nairobi.

1. A certain number of the Gomnese children,  
whose parents are in the employ of the Railway,  
attend the mixed school, the late Railway School; it  
would be possible to extend this school so as to  
provide for the rest of the Gomnese Community, but  
the influx of the large number of Gomnese children  
would be sure to result in the European children,  
whose parents are able to pay the small fees  
charged, leaving the school.

2. The deputation pointed out that there are  
now some 40 children of their Community in Nairobi  
who are of an age to attend school and that in the  
absence of local educational facilities they have to  
send their children to be educated in India, which  
is expensive besides entailing separation from their  
families.

3. The Gomnese are a large and influential  
Community in East Africa, they own a number of shops  
and stores and supply most of the clerical staff of

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our Government Departments. It is becoming more difficult to get good clerks from India at the rates we have been accustomed to pay, and I think that, apart from the claims the Goanese have to look for educational facilities in the country in which they are domiciled, it will be distinctly to our advantage to keep their children in the Protectorate, where they can be trained to fill the vacancies in the Clerical Staff when old enough to join it.

5. The deputation told me the Goanese hoped to be able to raise amongst them a sum of between Rs.4,000 to Rs.6,000 towards the building of a school house at Nairobi if Government would contribute about the same amount. The fees would average Rs.4 per month, and besides the Nairobi children there would be others wishing to join the school from Mombasa and Kisumu, and up to Entebbe. Such would number an additional 20, and the Goanese in Nairobi would arrange for the boarding of outside children. A European Master and an Assistant Goanese Master would be required, whose salaries would almost be met by the fees.

6. I am prepared to favourably consider the proposal which will be gone into more in detail by the School Committee and funds are available this year, under School Building Grants, to meet the contribution suggested. The school would, of course, be a Government School and educate at first up to the 4th Indian Standard.

7. The whole question of Education of the children

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of Europeans, Gomnese, Asiatics, Arabs and Natives is so important and is so difficult to deal with without expert advice that I have ventured to-day to telegraph and ask Your Lordship to approach the India Office with a view to an officer of the Bombay Educational Department being deputed to Nairobi to advise me on a general scheme of education for the Protectorate - we have none of us any practical experience of dealing with educational questions - and I look upon the deputation of such an officer as I propose, well acquainted with the practical working of an educational system in the East, as of very great importance, and I trust that the India Office will be able to spare his services at once. The expenses will be met from the Educational Vote for the present year, which I am unable to spend in full until the various problems connected with Education in East Africa are brought nearer to a solution than they are at present.

8. I suggest an officer from the Bombay Educational Department because that Presidency is more intimately connected with East Africa, our Gomnese and most of our Asiatic traders coming from that part of India.

9. My latest despatches on the subject of Education are Nos. 412 and 457 of the 19th ultimo and 15th instant respectively.
