R.A.F., but it must be remembered that there
are other officers such as Capt. Armitage
and Col. Wallington who have had serious
attacks of blackwater fever but who still
live & go back to Africa.

My Lord,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of Your Lordship's despatch, confidential, of the 21st ultime.

2. As desired in para 6 I have offered the post of Commissioner of Police in Uganda to Captain Riddick, which he has accepted. I am now communicating with the Governor of Uganda as to the time of his taking charge. Captain Riddick asks that in view of the fact that he had three attacks of blackwater fever on the West Coast, his name may be noted for transfer to a healthier climate when an opportunity offers. I consider this to be a reasonable request and recommend it for Your Lordship's favourable consideration.

3. The fullest support will be accorded to the new Inspector General and Commissioner of Police both by myself and the Officers of this Administration

I have the honor to inform you that I have received through the Gov. of the U.A.S. an application from Capt. Riddick, who has been appointed Commissioner of Police in Uganda, for transfer to a healthier climate.

I request that you will inform Capt. Riddick that his name will be noted for transfer in the event of suitable vacancy occurring, but that it is doubtful whether it will be possible to meet his wishes. If the state of Capt. Riddick's health renders him unsuited for service in Uganda, I fear that it may become necessary to consider the question of retiring him on pension.
