

Sir,

I have the honour to report the following facts relating to the death of Surveyor Sergeant Major Max who died on September 6th 1908 at old Nandi station (Kapturu). According to Sergeant Durkan's R.C.A. report Mr. Cox had an attack of malarial fever on August 26th and was very ill for four days on the march from Mulgoroni station to Nandi. They also experienced very disagreeable and wet weather at each camp and at the Kibigori river they were both drenched.

On the 27th August Mr. Durkan persuaded Mr. Cox to halt until a Doctor should arrive. He would not give his consent to this and ordered Mr. Durkan to push on. On the 28th August he was still suffering from high fever etc and in this condition he ascended the Nandi Mts. on a mule and was completely exhausted when they pitched camp on a high hill overlooking Nandi station. Mr. Cox had in the meantime been treating himself with Quinine tabletoids daily.

Symptoms of Bilious fever appeared in the afternoon of the 29th and a runner was sent to Kapasbit station for medical aid.

On the 30th at the Hospital Assistant arrived in the afternoon after a terrific hail storm. He diagnosed fever, and found that the general patient was very grave. After great difficulty succeeded in reviving him.

On September 1st a slight improvement took place.

and owing to the camp being exposed to wet and cold weather he was removed to an empty bridge house to the station.

On the following day all the symptoms of blackwater fever had passed away. I saw the patient on September 3rd and found that he was suffering from prostration with extreme pallor of the skin. He took his nourishment well and regularly which consisted of milk chicken broth, egg, bacon, and beef tea.

Medicaments in the form of whisky, Digitalis, & opium had to be given every one or two hours.

On the thirteenth at 12 noon he had a collapse his temperature fell to 96° F., rigors pulse very rapid almost imperceptible; respiration very short and quick with rasping sounds, about 44 to the minute. He then passed into a semi-conscious and restless condition. Both the action of the heart and stridulous respiration evidently indicated a failing heart, which in my opinion had been overstrained by the journey up the escarpment and from the effects of blackwater fever. I am also inclined to think that a great portion to weakness of the heart had been in existence for so a time.

At 2 a.m. on the fourteenth the condition became critical and death occurred at 2 a.m. on September 14th from failure of the heart.

I would like to add that he had received most considerate attention and nursing both from Corporal Dugay and Hospital Assistant Dr. Maidya. They did everything that was possible for them to do.

With kind regards to Mr. Commissioner and Major General, a Coffin was bought & paid in the afternoon.
