My Lord,

With reference to paragraph 4 of Your Lordship's despatch No. 353 of the 31st of July last I have the honour to transmit herewith two authenticated and ten printed copies of an Ordinance to make provision for a Provident Fund for the non-pensionable servants of State Railways, to which I have assented in the name of His Majesty.

MEMORANDUM.

This Ordinance is to make provision for a provident fund for the non-pensionable servants of the Railway. Certain rules were sent to the G.O. for a royal. But before the rules could be adopted, an Ordinance had to be passed to enable rules to be made. The Bill is taken from certain Indian Acts and Rules (which are more fully explained in the Schedule) some of these do not apply to this Protectorate. The Government are generally approved of the draft rules from which the Ordinance has been drafted and care will be taken in making the rules under the Ordinance that the suggestions suggested by the G.O. will be complied with. Mr. Currie has explained very fully in his Memorandum which accompanied Your Excellency's despatch to G.O. No. 444 the reason for this legislation.

Definitions.

Receiver to have power to make rules in certain cases.

As this the Manager of the Uganda Railways informs me
is practically identical with a similar section
in the Indian State Railways Provident Fund Rules
in which our rules have been drafted and follows the
Indian Provident Funds Act IX of 1907 but we have not
got a copy in our office.

(2). There are identical with similar sections in the
Indian State Railways Provident Fund Rules with the
exception that in those rules Rs. 2,000 is the limit
instead of Rs. 1,000 on our Ordinance.

This is accepted from the Indian Rules that is regulated
by the Indian Succession Act (X of 1925) and the
Administrative General Act (11 of 1971) and the
Succession Certificate Act (VII of 1959) - Certain
of these Acts are not applied to the Protectorate.
