Sir,

Enclosed I beg to state that I am unable to remember the contents of my past correspondence therefore I am not in a position to say if by communicating that I may have said whatever P.C. Earle may have stated does not constitute me in the least. I am afraid there are several facts which you do not know concerning this affair and it is best that I should explain.

P.Cs. Earle and Tilcock left for England at the beginning of a month. After they had left and not paid their Mess bills it was talked over by several members of the Mess as to the best way of meeting the Tradesman's bills. It was decided to put an equal amount on to each remaining member's bill to make up for the deficiency. This was carried out by P.C. Williams who made up the bills and I think that I can safely say that every P.C. paid although there was some dissatisfaction. After 2 or 3 days the extra money was handed back by P.C. Williams and he informed me that Sergeant Major Bradney had refused to pay and he had seen Captain Moulton on the subject and it had been decided to send P.Cs. Earle and Tilcock's Mess bills to the Provost Marshal Aldershot. Now if I did write to P.C. Earle and tell him that "the bills had been paid between us" etc. etc. etc. I have turned up, between the time that I and others paid and the time that the money was returned I will be sure that I said anything untrue. I wish to infer that this is only a suggestion on my part as to what may have happened and it appears extraordinary for the contents of a private letter to be taken in preference to the contents of a letter from the Head of a Department.
