Dear Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of
 your two despatches Nos. 458 and 459 of the 21st
 July and 28th August respectively, on the subject of
 the necessary training of officers recently appointed to
 the various branches of the Native Police force in
 the Colony.

With regard to the methods selected for
 the training of the Native Police force, I am afraid
 that it will be difficult to secure a general course of the greatest use
 to all the different classes of officers, as the
 various districts are separated from each other by great distances.
 It would be desirable, however, to still continue the
 system which is in existence now, namely driving in the country
 roads, in pairs, in the open country for a short
 period after the first few days, and to require them to
 pass through the towns and cities, so as to give them
 an opportunity of seeing the towns and cities,
 and the Colonies.

4. I thoroughly approve the proposal to select a certain

number of candidates, in addition to those required to

fill existing vacancies, in anticipation of vacancies,

and I would strongly recommend that in the case of East

Africa the second alternative suggested in paragraph 40 of

despatch 459 be followed.

5. For one thing such a system would help us with the shortage of officers which so frequently occurs owing mainly to officers proceeding on leave, and there are always savings on salaries from which their salaries could be met.

Her appointment. The subjects of instruction are Law, Account, Tropical Hygiene & Tropical Economic Products, and three courses, lasting from two to three months, are held in the year.

In the order to obviate the delay in filling vacancies which would otherwise occur owing under this system, it has been found desirable to select candidates at the beginning of each course in regard of the number of vacancies, in anticipation of the occurrence of further vacancies before the end

of the course. The number of candidates selected in this way has been & will continue to be based on carefully recorded experience of past appointments on former occasions, but it must be expected that occasionally the anticipated number of vacancies will not have occurred at the end of the course of instruction. In this case it becomes a question of

- (a) sending the selected candidates to the Col. or Prob. in ad-

vacancies are most
likely to occur as
supernumeraries to be
shorted on the first
opportunity, or (b) retaining
such candidates at home, pending
the occurrence
of vacancies, and paying
them an appropriate
allowance for return for
their holidays themselves
available to take up

candidates while there.

It will be observed
in elsewhere in
